Twin Ports Express: non-stop and first class all the way

Get set for a jam-packed three days as Twin Ports Express – the annual convention of the Thousand Lakes Region – leaves the station on May 2. It'll be a combination of indoor activities at the Duluth Depot, and outdoor trips and tours around town.

Before we get into the nitty gritty, we need to remind you that you're on your own for lodging for the three days – a hotel room isn't included in the registration fee. However, the Duluth/Superior area has many fine hotels and motels to choose from. Note that the Duluth Radisson Hotel, located just a block from the Depot, is giving the TLR a special rate on rooms for the duration of the convention: \$89 per night. We've reserved a block of 50 rooms, so if you'd like to stay there, make your reservations early.



When you register at the Depot, you'll receive a spiffy Convention Packet which includes the daily schedule, layout tour information, and other things you'll need to know. As an extra bonus, all convention attendees will receive a free Family Membership to the Lake Superior Railroad Museum, good for the remainder of 2008. That's a \$60 value!

The convention begins on Friday, May 2, bright and early. In fact, if you can, arrive in Duluth on Thursday night. Convention registration will be open at The Depot until 10 p.m. that evening, in addition to all day Friday and from 8 a.m. until noon on Saturday. You'll find registration materials at the main desk in the Depot.

FRIDAY FOR THE RAILS: When the opening bell sounds at 8 a.m., the Contest Room doors will swing open to receive your models and will remain open until noon. Meanwhile, at 8 a.m., Patrick Dorin will get things off to a rolling start with his clinic, "Passenger Services in Duluth/Superior." If you thought you knew passenger operations in this part of the country, you may be in for quite a surprise. Patrick promises to tell many interesting stories.

He'll be followed at 9 a.m. by Cody Grivno, Associate editor of *Model Railroader* magazine, and his clinic, "Wisconsin Railroads," a look at rail activity in our neighbor to the east. At that same time in our second clinic room, Prairie Lakes Division Superintendent Doug Harding will talk about the colorful history of the Fairmont Railway Motor Company.

At 10 a.m. Cody and Doug will switch gears and present two different clinics. Cody's "Railfanning in the Dakotas" will provide a wealth of information for modelers of the Upper Midwest. Doug will deliver an interesting clinic on "Railroad Livestock Handling Facilities."

Who was Jock Oliphant and why does he have an award named after him?

Each year at the General Membership meeting at our TLR Convention, we have a brief awards show at which winners of the modeling contest are recognized. One of the awards given out is the "Jock Oliphant Award for Model Craftsmanship." Many of our newer members, and newer model railroaders, don't really know who Jock was.

Jock was a TLR member who lived in Manitoba and was renowned for his attention to detail and craftsmanship. In fact, Jock was the only modeler to ever in the NMRA's Best In Show model contest three years in a row, from 1962 to 1964. People knew him best for his large, highly detailed structures, such as mines and coal docks. Every one of those Gold Award winners was incorporated into his magnificent home layout.

In addition, Jock was a lifetime member of the NMRA and was Master Model Railroader #15. He died in 2000 at the age of 78

In memoriam

In memory of Jim B. Perske

Jim Perske, National Model Railroad Association life member, Thousand Lakes Region member and founding member of the Twin Cities Division died peacefully at home on January 30, 2008 surrounded by his loving family. At 78 years of age Jim led a full life with a love of model trains that started in his youth while railfanning with his father. During his youth he accompanied his father while filming movies of the colorful and varied railroads throughout Wisconsin and Minnesota. In his attic they would set up and run a wide variety of early tinplate trains. Eventually Jim married Audrey, and moved East in his occupation as a safety engineer working for the St. Paul companies. He was a member of the Washington, D.C. model railroad club and made time to railfan when driving between inspections. Jim grew to love the Clinchfield Railroad and an obscure little narrow gauge called the East Tennessee and North Carolina RWY (The Tweetsie).

After returning to the Twin Cities Jim would frequent Woodcraft Hobby shop on Lake Street to purchase equipment for his railroad, named "The Clinchfield and Ohio." There he met Doug Hodgdon who invited him to join in regular operating sessions on Friday nights at Doug's home. For Jim this was just a starting point. Jim's passion for model railroading and love of people drove him to become involved in many different railroad groups throughout his life. Among groups not already mentioned: G-Whiz Gang, Tuesday Night Roundhouse, Minneapolis Society of Model Engineers, Twin City Model Railroad Museum, and various historical societies.

Jim was not a person who joined a group just to be a member; he was active, he was a "doer." At conventions and train shows he was always helping promote the hobby. At monthly get togethers at the Countryside Restaurant, later TCD monthly clinics, he frequently assisted with the model railroad clin-

ics. In the 1970's and 1980's we were fortunate to have annual model train shows at Har Mar Mall and Northtown. At the shows Jim became a frequent displayer which led to his being invited to display his modeling at the 1977 MRIA show.

In 1981 the Model Railroad Industry Association, MRIA, began plans to return to the Twin Cities with their annual industry show and meetings. Jim was one of the original committee members who helped plan and make the 1982 MRIA show a success.

In May 1982 the Twin Cities Division became a Minnesota Nonprofit Corporation. Jim was the first Secretary of the TCD. He helped organize, set the vision and the standard for the new Division. During his first year as an

officer the TCD was the local sponsor of the 1982 MRIA show. Jim continued to serve as TCD Vice-President in 1983-1984.

After Jim joined the Thousand Lakes Region he became an active volunteer recruiting new members. He served on the TLR Board of Directors as Secretary for 1983 – 1984 and Treasurer for 1985-1986. While serving the TLR Jim received the President's Award in 1988, the Bob Dew, Sr. Memorial Service Award in 1994, as well as being recognized with the "Bent Spike" award in the same year.

He joined with others to build a modular layout that could run long trains. Jim would often let children run the train. With a sparkle in his eye he would introduce a child to the joys he remembered from his youth. That simple action eventually resulted in a "Junior Engineer Certificate" that he would fill out with their name and give to them after running the train around the layout.

Jim was passionate about his hobby and compassionate with people. He hated conflict. He was always one to find the best in others and see both sides of an issue. His skills helped us all while he was an active member of the Thousand Lakes Region and Twin Cities Division.

Jim is survived by his wife Audrey; children Jay (Cindy) Perske and Jeanae (James) Justen; grandchildren, Nickolas, Nastassia, Josiah, Elijah, Zackary, Jacob and Jessa; brother Gerald (Elsie) Perske and a large extended family.

His contributions of time and energy were enormous. Jim will be missed; but not forgotten.

Portable switching layout proves to be a big hit during “Trains at Christmas” in Sioux Falls

Hundreds of model train fans of all ages enjoyed viewing and operating on the HO-scale Airlake Industrial Park, featured during “Trains at Christmas” last November in Sioux Falls. Just as with the prototype found in Lakeville, MN, there’s no runaround track in the park. This requires the engineer and conductor to use two switchers to complete their work. The 36” x 159” layout sits on two hollow core doors with pink foam insulation subroadbed. Painted and ballasted Atlas code 83 track with #5 turnouts, Caboose Industries ground throws, and a foot high sky blue hardboard backdrop give the layout a realistic look. A Digtrax DCC Zephyr system operates the layout.

Sessions consist of making pick-ups from among the 14 industries, gleaned from one of the three cycle switch lists. Outbound cars move onto the two industrial park tracks adjacent the Progressive Rail warehouse.

Next, inbound cars are pulled off the Canadian Pacific mainline, running from Northfield to Savage, modeled along the front edge of the 50” high layout. This keeps the main free for CP traffic. Next, the switching crew figures out how to make the setouts before shoving outbound cars back on the CP main.

The layout made its public debut during the Chicago and Northwestern Historical Society convention held in Huron. It’s entertained hundreds of train fans and will hopefully do so in the future...under someone else’s ownership. Plans are to sell the layout

Clinics, layout tours, contests and more highlight Twin Cities Division’s busy season

The Twin Cities Division continues to hold clinics, layout tours, and contests.

Monthly clinics are held by the Twin Cities Division at the Mill City Museum in downtown Minneapolis on the second Thursday of each month from October to April. Generally, each clinic consists of three parts: a modeling clinic focusing on techniques to improve our modeling skills, a prototype clinic which usually consists of slide presentations on various railroads, and the modeling contest where participants bring in examples of their best modeling efforts of a certain theme which changes from month to month.

Recently, our modeling clinics have included structure building, programming DCC decoders, and how to care for your

magazine collections. Upcoming modeling clinics will deal with tree construction, and sound for our trains.

Prototype clinics that have happened so far this year have been a slide presentation on the CB&Q and upper Midwest railroad stations. The February clinic featured one member’s trip around the country on Amtrak, and turned out to be a lesson on how riding the rails in the USA can still be a fine way to get around the country.

Contest themes have included Steam Engines, Cattle Cars, and photo displays. Upcoming are Maintenance of Way Equipment, Boxcars, and Whimsical Railroads.

After a hiatus of over a year, we have again begun to have layout tours. Two occurred in 2007, and another is tentatively planned for April 2008.

Superintendent Ron Bodin has made it an objective to visit every model railroad club in

the Twin Cities metropolitan area in order to foster more cooperation between the TCD and local clubs. He has hit most of them, but has a few to go.

The Crossing Gate, TCD’s newsletter, has changed to accommodate technological advances by offering members a choice between the traditional paper newsletter in black and white, or a color version sent via email. We are encouraging as many members as possible to switch to the email delivery mode as the cost savings allows the TCD to provide other benefits to members.

Finally, TCD is addressing the issue of membership that has been a hot topic in the NMRA lately. We are re-writing our bylaws and are more clearly defining the rights and responsibilities of membership. It is the goal of the TCD Board of Directors to increase the number and level of participation in the NMRA of model railroaders in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area.





Quick and easy modeling project: a gondola load

With Spring just around the corner, many of us don't want to start on a major modeling project. So if you're looking for a quick and easy project to get the modeling juices flowing I suggest you try a corrugated culvert pipe open load.

To model the load you'll need some corrugated culvert pipe, 2"x4" scale lumber, graphic art tape, and Walther's Goo.

The corrugated culvert pipe I used is Sadders Enterprises corrugated culvert pipe. Each package contains four pipes, so you'll need two packages for this project. If you can't find it at your local hobby shop you can order it online at www.saddersenterprises.com, part number MS-32. The graphic art tape is available at the local office supply store. I could only purchase a 1/16" wide tape, so I bought that. If you can find a 1/32" wide tape, purchase that instead.

I took a gondola and measured the inside width with a caliper, although a scale rule will work fine. Mine was 8' 9". I cut the 2"x4" scale lumber that length. If you build the culvert load as pictured, three culvert rows high, you need 12 pieces of 2"x4" material.

To build the load I used the gondola itself as a jig. I placed the first four pieces of lumber on the floor in the bottom of the gondola. The culverts will rest on these. I didn't glue the lumber pieces to the gondola floor because the load needs to be removable later on to add the banding. Even if you want a removable load, wait to glue the stripwood to the gondola floor until after the banding is added. You can glue it into the gondola after the banding is added. I personally like removable loads for operation.

The first culvert is then glued in the center on top of the four lumber pieces using Walther's Goo. I simply eyeballed the center line. Then glue the two outside culverts in place to create the three-wide culvert load. Another row of 2"x4" lumber is added on top of the culverts, being sure to line each up with the one in the bottom row. Add another row of three culverts.

Now use the graphic art tape to create the banding for the bottom two rows. I attached the tape at the bottom of the load and wrapped the tape around the culverts until I met the starting point. While you can use the 1/16" wide tape as-is, I cut it in half for what I thought was better looking banding. However, this is not necessary to get a good looking load.

Once you have the first and second row banded, add another row of 2"x4" lumber pieces on top and the last two corrugated culvert pipes. Finally, add the banding to secure the second and top row together. I just passed the graphic art tape between the first and second row and attached it to one of the top row culverts. With one end attached to a top culvert, the other end is just wrapped around the second and top row culvert meeting the other end of the tape at the top start point. The load is now complete. For additional strength I put a tiny drop of CA glue at each wood and pipe joint that I could easily reach.

You now have completed a good looking corrugated culvert pipe load. With the creative modeling juices flowing you might want to try a more difficult load, such as the culvert load on the flat car in the background.

For an easy modeling project, give corrugated pipe loads a try!



A painting turntable for small items


Here is an inexpensive and easy way to create a turntable for painting small to medium sized parts. Go to the local home hardware center and pick up a ceramic tile 4" x 6" or 6" x 6" as well as a 3"x3" Lazy Susan swivel. It's about \$6 for both unless you want to buy a fancy tile.

When you get home, flip the tile over and epoxy the Lazy Susan to the bottom. Let this dry for a day or two, then turn it over and use it. That's it! Quick, easy, cheap and simple, but does it come in handy when you are airbrushing parts. Now you don't have to hold the parts and try to turn them with one hand while you hold the airbrush with the other. I even use this device when I brush paint parts - it's much simpler to turn the tile than move the parts around.

A quick tip: if you tape a piece of wax paper on the tile, clean up is easier and the parts don't stick. Plus it keeps your tile looking clean and presentable next to your bench.

That brings us to 11 a.m. You're on your own for lunch, but don't make it a long one because the tour bus will be leaving the Depot at noon for Hallett Dock, Cenex Harvest States, and the Midwest Energy Resources Company (MERC). This is a prototype tour par excellence.

MERC is the largest coal unloading dock in the world and features a 4-car rotary dumper.

The tour bus is scheduled to arrive back at the Depot at 4 p.m., giving you plenty of time to explore downtown Duluth, visit Carr's Hobby Shop (about a mile from the Depot), or simply gaze at those digital photos you took earlier in the day.

Our Dessert Reception begins at 7 p.m. on the main floor of the Depot and you won't want to miss it. We'll be holding an auction and a drawing for two diesel cab rides for a portion of Saturday's trip to Two Harbors. The winners will ride up front with the engineer for approximately 1 hour each. Each winner's ride will cover half of the trip to or from Two Harbors. Drawing tickets will cost just \$5, and you can buy as many as you'd like.

But all is not lost for those who don't win the ride! Besides the cab ride, we'll be holding drawings for several big bundles of great model railroad "stuff." So you could still come out a winner.

The ride to Two Harbors will take approximately two hours, the majority of which runs along lovely Lake Superior. A box lunch will be served on the train.

Passengers will be able to stretch their legs for two hours in Two Harbors, visiting the famous lighthouse, the Dwan/3M Museum (*did you know that 3M got its start in Two Harbors?*), the Two Harbors Depot, or the Edna G steam powered tugboat. There are also two well-stocked antique stores in town. If time per-

mits, the Twin Ports Express train will make a photo run-by. We'll re-board at 2 p.m. and should return to the Depot by 4 p.m.

But the fun isn't over yet. At 6:00 everyone will gather at dockside to board the Vista Queen on a harbor dinner cruise. (Don't worry -- the boat's enclosed and heated!) Dinner will be a combination of both Prime Rib and Champagne Chicken. Address any special dietary needs to convention director Chris Dancy; contact information is on the Registration Form.

We'll return back to port by 9 p.m. and the contest room will be opened for viewing by everyone.

SUNDAY FOR EVERYONE We'll begin the day with our TLR General Membership meeting at 9 a.m. We'll be electing some new officers, so please try to attend. We'll also hold our annual awards ceremony at this meeting.

At 11 a.m. the swap meet doors will be opened for one hour to TLR members only. The general public is admitted at noon. The meet is sponsored by the Lake Superior Transportation Club, and promises good deals for everyone.

Finally, to top off a great three days, we'll have several local layouts you can visit on your way home. Names, addresses, and maps will be provided in your convention packet.
